A Note from Fr. José Arroyo

Dear Brothers & Sisters,

This month our "saint of the month" is our very own, St. Paul of the Cross, founder of the Congregation of the Passion of Jesus Christ, also known as the Passionists. Hopefully, we come to appreciate his role in our spiritual lives and participate in different opportunities within our parish community surrounding his patronal feast day on October 20th.

The most important event that we will have surrounding our patronal feast day is the 40 Hours Devotion requested by Bishop Rhoades. This is a Eucharistic-centered event in which all from our parish community will come to our beloved Church building throughout the 40 Hours, with the intention of worshiping Jesus, sacramentally present in the Eucharist from Sunday until Tuesday. The Devotion will end with a solemn Mass.

Traditionally, 40 Hours Devotion includes consecutive Eucharistic adoration which would be non-stop throughout the day and night. At our parish, like other neighboring parishes, we will have a sign-up sheet for different slots for you and your family to come and pray, although the slots will not include times after Midnight and before 6 a.m.

The 40 Hours Devotion is a parish-based event. Therefore, I expect all members of the families that make-up our beloved parish, including the different apostolates and ministries that meet and identify themselves as members of St. Paul of the Cross, to participate according to your busy schedules. There will be plenty of opportunities to come and pray for our families, church, country, and world during the morning, day, and night. If a person works 1st, 2nd, or 3rd shift there are time slots for you! If a person has to go to school and has extracurricular activities such as sports, there will be time slots for you! Please make this a priority in your schedule. Sometimes we spend more time in front of a

computer, t.v., phone, tablet, or at a gym rather than what is being proposed for this time (at least 30 minutes). We will provide different types of prayers and silence throughout the hours and days including the Liturgy of the Hours and Chaplet of Divine Mercy. We will also have the privilege of flying in a preacher at different evenings, recommended by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). Stay tuned for more details!!!

Since the Catholic Church believes that Jesus is present in body, blood, soul, and divinity in the Eucharistic species of both the bread and the wine, we worship the consecrated Host, even after the Mass, since His divine presence remains under the appearance of the bread. We usually reserve the extra consecrated Hosts in the tabernacle. The Catholic teaching is that we believe that the bread is transformed into the Body of Christ. For this reason, it is quite miraculous that the appearance of bread (which our senses can observe), remains intact, when the substance of bread and wine are transformed. In theology, this is what is called transubstantiation. The beautiful reality is that in the Eucharist, Jesus fulfills His promise: "Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

Once again, I encourage all to start thinking of which time slots you can cover according to your schedules and know that praying before the Most Blessed Sacrament is the best spiritual investment, we can make for ourselves and for our families. In fact, I want to remind all the men of our parish that they are called to be spiritual leaders with their households and to make it a priority to select a day and a time in which you and your whole family plan to participate in, just as you do for other important events in your lives. The Church, our country and the whole world need more Eucharistic "prayer warriors." May we hear the Lord inviting us, including all of us who are busy with many plans: "Be still and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:11).

Why are we celebrating the Forty Hours Devotion now? Our

Bishop has asked each parish to designate a time of Eucharist Devotion for the Parish Year of the Eucharistic Revival. This presents a wonderful opportunity to explore, develop, and deepen our appreciation of the Eucharist. The primary setting for the promotion of a life centered in the Eucharist is, of course, the celebration of Mass, but the Church also offers other means of deepening a Eucharistic-centered faith. One such practice is adoration where we gather to pray before the Lord as his presence is revealed to us in the mystery of the eucharistic bread which is truly the Body of Christ. The Forty Hours Devotion gives us the opportunity to come as a community to pray before the Lord in solemn adoration.

What are the Spiritual Goals of the 40 Hours Devotion?

Through solemn exposition the faithful should remember that Jesus' presence derives from the sacrifice of the Mass and thus its purpose is both sacramental and spiritual communion. Spending time during the devotion is meant to draw the person into an ever deeper share in the Paschal Mystery so that they can respond with gratitude to the gift of Christ present in the Eucharist. Participation is a path to enjoy Christ's intimate friendship; to pray for themselves, those dear to them and for the world; and to strive to worship Christ in a manner fitting to their way of life. Through prayer in solemn exposition the faithful can offer their entire lives with Christ to the Father in the Holy Spirit; derive and increase in faith, hope and charity; extend the union with Christ reached in reception of communion; renew the covenant; be strengthened to live out the covenant received through faith and sacrament; and are reminded to live their whole lives:


- strengthened by sacramental communion,
- as sharers in the Paschal Mystery (Christ's death/resurrection/ ascension, the pouring forth of the Holy Spirit, and Christ's return),
- eager to do good works and to please God,
- to instill in the world the Christian spirit, and
- to become witnesses to Christ
