A Note from Fr. José Arroyo

Dear Brothers & Sisters,

This 3rd Sunday of Advent, is also known as "Gaudete Sunday." The word Gaudete means "Rejoice;" taken from the first word of the Introit/entrance antiphon for this Mass which in Latin is: "Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete. In English this means: "Rejoice in the Lord always: I shall say it again, rejoice" (Phil 4:4). The liturgical color is rose/pink, and the Church allows flowers in the sanctuary as a contrast to the penitential tone of the beginning of this season of Advent.

There are many reasons we should rejoice. The more aware we are of our blessings, the more grateful we become and the less excuses we have to complain of the difficulties that life presents. The very fact that Jesus comes to us in the Eucharist each day, especially in our Sunday liturgies should impel us to get out of our beds with a sense of joy because we come before the presence of the One who has created us, redeemed us, and sanctifies us despite our imperfections.

This Sunday, the Church presents St. John the Baptist as the one who witnesses the Messiah come. who is to St. John humbly acknowledges that Jesus is the One who is far mightier than him. St. John teaches in the desert that there would be One who will ultimately proclaim freedom and deliverance from sin and death. As Catholic Christians we believe that this Messiah is Jesus Christ who came once in swaddling clothes but will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and His kingdom will have no end.

As we continue our Advent journey, may we join with the Blessed Virgin Mary in singing the praises of God. We praise the Lord by encountering Him at prayer, especially at Mass and Eucharistic Adoration, but also in reading and studying Sacred Scripture and going to help the poor, the sick, and the outcasted. We are called to praise the Lord by being faithful to our daily responsibilities and tasks in the midst of the world as Catholic Christians who believe and acknowledge Jesus as the Lord of our lives within the Church building and at home. Sometimes we are devout among fellow believers. However, when we are with our closest relatives and friends, we tend to forget the need to be coherent in our convictions as faith-filled Christians.

Next week we will celebrate the last week of Advent which will technically end before the 5 p.m. Christmas Eve Mass. It is the shortest Advent possible since it ends on December 24th. As a reminder, please make sure that you observe the special schedule for the different Masses that lead to Christmas. We do have the opportunity and the responsibility to attend Mass twice, one for the 4th Sunday and the other for Christmas. Let us live these last weeks of Advent as a time of joyful expectation and not as a time that we have to get through in order to get to Christmas. Let us remember that the most valuable things in life usually require much preparation, including the gift of life which biologically takes time to develop from the womb to the tomb. A blessed rest of Advent to all and remember: "Rejoice in the Lord always: I shall say it again, rejoice."


Friday Adoration

Gaudete Sunday

Why is rose used during Advent in the Advent wreath and vestments?

Advent is a time of penance, and so the ordinary liturgical color for Advent is violet. On the third Sunday of Advent, which is also called *Gaudete* (Latin: "Rejoice") Sunday, we recognize the joyful anticipation of the season that will culminate in the birth of Christ on Christmas by changing the liturgical color to rose. Rose is a "brightening" of the ordinary violet and thus symbolizes joy.

Catholics are obligated to attend Mass every Sunday and Holy Day (including Christmas). This year, even though the Sunday and Christmas obligations fall back-to-back, each has their own, distinct obligation. Catholics must attend a different Mass for each obligation - two Masses total.

Sat., December 23rd 5:00pm 7:00pm (Spanish) Sun., December 24th 9:00am

Christmas Masses

Sun., December 24th 5:00pm Midnight Mon., December 25th 9:00am Noon (Spanish)
